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DTI-A takes outreach to New Juaben & Pentecost SHS in the Eastern Region of Ghana

In October, Drive to Inspire — Africa resumed its outreach activities to senior high schools. As always, it was a joy for the team and volunteers to step out and engage with students, listen to their questions, and share practical lessons to guide their growth.

This round of outreach took the team to New Juaben Senior High School and Pentecost Senior High School in the Eastern Region. The sessions focused on issues that continue to shape the lives of young people both in and outside the classroom. Speakers led discussions on discipline and self-leadership, encouraging students to build habits that foster consistency, respect, and focus in their academic and personal journeys.

Another important topic addressed was the dangers of substance and alcohol abuse, highlighting how such habits can affect decision-making, health, and long-term potential. The sessions encouraged students to make choices that align with their goals and to find strength in saying no to peer pressure.

In recognition of Breast Cancer Awareness Month, students also learned about the importance of early detection and regular screening. Health professionals emphasized that awareness and early action can save lives, and encouraged students to become advocates for healthy living among their peers and families. The students were also taught how to self-examine for breast cancer.

The team was joined by representatives from the Ghana Armed Forces, along with professionals from healthcare, media, entertainment. agriculture and agribusiness. and law. information technology. They held breakout sessions where students explored different career paths, asked thoughtful questions, and shared their aspirations. There was also a University Life session that gave students a realistic look at tertiary education and how to adjust academically, socially, emotionally.

As part of the Touched Initiative, some students were recognized and awarded for their confidence, curiosity, and active participation throughout the programme. Their enthusiasm reflected a genuine desire to learn and grow, which deeply impressed the facilitators and volunteers.

The DTI-A team commended all participating students for their discipline, respect, and engagement during the sessions. Their energy and openness made the outreach both impactful and rewarding.

This outreach reaffirmed our commitment to inspiring young people to live intentionally and make informed choices that lead to a brighter future.























Digital Awareness campaign



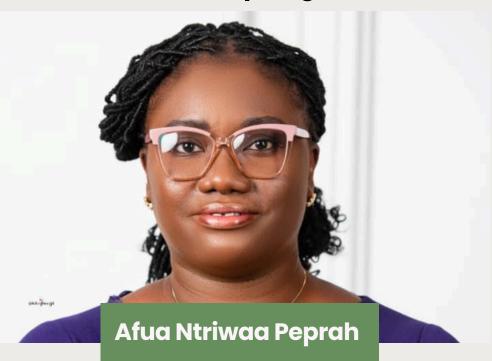

Afua currently volunteers with several nonprofit organisations that champion young people, women, and technology, one of which is Drive to Inspire — Africa. She is deeply passionate about mentorship, education, and technology as tools for empowerment.

A lifelong learner, Afua's academic path began at St. Roses Secondary School,

Akwatia, after which she earned a Bachelor's degree in Business Management from Lakeland University in Sheboygan, Wisconsin (2010). She later completed a Master of Arts in Advanced Teaching (MAT) from the University of the People, an American-accredited online university, in 2023.

Her time at Tech4Girls and her volunteer role as a Technology Career Advisor with Drive to Inspire — Africa have been pivotal in merging her advocacy for education with technological fluency. These experiences have allowed her to facilitate innovative learning opportunities that integrate technology into education, preparing the next generation of tech-savvy professionals.

Webinar: Building Fitness and Balance in a busy world with Ogechik'nma Akinola



On Thursday, 9th October 2025, DTI-A hosted another insightful session in our Monthly Webinar Series. The discussion, led by Oge Akinola, MA, EMBA, CPT, NASM, focused on the theme "Thriving in the hustle: Building fitness, wellness, and balance in a busy world." It shed light on one of the most pressing issues facing young professionals across Africa today: work-related stress, and how balance, faith, and intentional living can help overcome it.

According to the World Health Organisation, work-related stress among young professionals in Africa continues to rise, impacting both productivity and well-being. Oge emphasized that while ambition and drive are important, true success comes from balance, wisdom, and grace, not exhaustion.

She introduced what she calls the "Four Non-Negotiable Blocks," core areas every young person must prioritize to maintain balance and thrive in today's demanding world. Through real-life examples and practical insights, she reminded participants that God never called us to burnout; He called us to breakthrough.

One of the most powerful takeaways from the session came from Isaiah 40:31, which speaks to the renewal of strength through hope in God. Oge used this scripture to illustrate what she described as "The Isaiah Pace Principle," teaching that every season of life comes with its own pace. She reminded participants that every pace matters and that wisdom lies in embracing the season you are in, not rushing through it.

The session ended with a renewed sense of purpose among attendees. For many, it was a timely reminder to pursue their goals with discipline and faith while honoring their need for rest and balance.

Adaeze's dedication to agricultural innovation is deeply personal, stemming from her experience growing up in a poultry farming family and witnessing the financial devastation caused by unpredictable climate conditions and high bird mortality.

She founded Farmspeak Technology to leverage IoT, AI, and remote sensing to transition African agriculture from manual, high-risk practices to data-driven, climate-resilient operations. Her mission is to empower farmers, promote sustainability, and eliminate extreme poverty among

African farmers by increasing productivity and enhancing farm profitability.

While Farmspeak's flagship product, PenKeep, began with poultry, Adaeze and her team are actively working to extend the technology to aquaculture and greenhouse environments, showcasing a commitment to scalable, multi-sector agricultural solutions across the continent. She stands as a prominent voice in the movement to use green technology and local innovation food combat climate change and insecurity in Africa.

She was named the Global Young Entrepreneur of the Year 2024 by Youth Business International (YBI) and also received the Climate Entrepreneurship Award from the same organization
